Grand Chapter History

The archives of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Kansas bring us much insight into the history of Capitular Masonry in Kansas. The Grand High Priest of 1885, M.E. Companion George S. Green, of Manhattan Chapter No. 14, in his address to the Grand Chapter on its 20th Annual Convocation made some interesting comments.

The Grand Chapter had a little more than 50 chapter in Kansas with only 39 present at the meeting. There were 2,500 members of Capitular Masonry listed on the rolls for the year. This was good news for a young and fledgling Grand Chapter.

The Grand High Priest was a little upset by the state of some of the work being done. He commented on the degree conferrals having a "disposition to regard the time as an opportunity for fun, rather than for the inculcation of the true spirit of Royal Arch Masonry." It would appear, on the surface, our fellow Companions desired to have a little too much fun when working the beautiful degrees and lacked the necessary and proper focus to make the ceremonies of the degrees the solemn, yet beautiful, part of the work we have all come to love.

We have learned much from this lesson and we confer the degrees in the modern era with the decorum and honor required. This could be, in part, thanks to our M.E. Companion of almost 150 years prior. We do learn and we make changes and adjustments accordingly.



A Brief History of the Holy Royal Arch Degree

The history of the Holy Royal Arch Degree, like many other degrees, has several versions and dates of its origin being recorded and witnessed in various parts of the world.

The first written history we see of the conferral of the Holy Royal Arch Degree comes to us form Ireland. The January 14, 1744 edition of Faulkner's Dublin Journal stated during the St. John's Day Masonic Parade of December 27, 1743, two "Excellent Masons" marched through the streets carrying a "Royal Arch."

The oldest chapter known to exist is Stirling Rock Royal Arch Chapter No. 2 located in Bridge of Allan, Scotland. This chapter traces its earliest documented meetings to July 30, 1743. This leads one to believe there must be an earlier date for the conferral of the degree before the 1743 date given in both Ireland and Scotland.

There is no mention or appearance of the degree in England until the schism between the Ancients and the Moderns in 1738. Since there was no organized body of masons conferring the degree who were past masters, it had been decided by the Ancients, only those who passed the chair were eligible to learn the secrets of the degree. Because of this, the creation of the Virtual Past Master Degree was created and put into use.

In 1744, Fifield D'assigny wrote a book concerning how far freemasonry had fallen during his time within the Craft. He wrote about a new mason who had visited Dublin and claimed to be a Master of the Royal Arch and brought the degree to Dublin from York. In 1740, D'assigny wrote this mason had even managed to start a spurious capitular rite which appeared legitimate, until another brother who had actually taken the Holy Royal Arch Degree appeared and managed to set the spurious mason to task. The local masons, who were not amused at having an illegitimate rite's degree conferred on them, subsequently expelled the mason.

In 1792, the Premier Grand Lodge of London was noted as stating, "that the Grand Lodge of England has nothing to do with the proceedings of the Society of Royal Arch Masons." By 1813, the reconciliation of the two old Grand Lodges, that of the Ancients and the Moderns, was had and the United Grand Lodge of England was formed. In 1813, two bodies of Royal Arch Masons were in existence and they formally united together in 1817 as the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of England.

It would appear there is no generally agreed upon date for the first conferral of the degree, because of the passage of so much time. This should no deter our interest in this beautiful degree which completes the journey of the Master Mason in the third degree.

Great Plains Rendezvous

The Grand Council of Cryptic Masons of Kansas, together with the Grand Councils of Colorado and Wyoming, held their annual Great **Plains** Rendezvous meeting Hays, Kansas at Masonic Temple. The three degrees of Royal



Master, Select Master, and Super Excellent Master were all conferred in full form upon those candidates who had attended the Grand Master's Royal Arch Mason class a few weeks earlier in Emporia, Kansas. There were 47 members who attended the Rendezvous and who were now ready and qualified to receive the Orders of Christian Knighthood.

Others who attended and received the Super Excellent Master degree included many Cryptic Masons who had not received this beautiful and honorary degree. This degree is a pageant which is conferred in a public setting and tells an important story of the Babylonian captivity of the Jewish people and the importance of prophesy.

From the Grand Council Archives

The proceedings from the 1885 Annual Assembly of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of Kansas, which was held in Emporia, has some interesting information within its pages.

There were only 10 councils within the jurisdiction at this time, and all were present at the 2:00 PM convening of the Grand Council. The Most Illustrious Grand Master, Companion Jacob DeWitt of Newton Council No. 9, stated the future was bright for Cryptic Masonry within the jurisdiction. He noted in his address to the Cryptic Masons gathered, "the reports of our Subordinate Councils show marked accessions to our numbers, yet it is worthy of notice that these accessions are mainly in our younger councils; and the question arises, why is this so?" The M.I. Grand Master noted the older Councils had seemed to tire of the diligent labors required in the Secret Vault, while the younger Councils showed much zeal and fervency for their degrees and institution. He was buoyed by his belief the Councils would be strengthened in numbers and inspired with new zeal for the work.

After witnessing the last year in Cryptic Masonry in Kansas, we can see the zeal for which this jurisdiction has come together to confer the Grand Master's classes and the degrees of Cryptic Masonry on the newly made Companions of the Secret Vault.



The History of the Super Excellent Master Degree

The Super Excellent Master Degree is a beautiful and moving degree which is held and conferred under the Cryptic Degrees of the York Rite. In some jurisdictions, it is entirely a degree, while in others, it is allowed as a pageant where those who are not masons may attend and witness a part of the beauty and history of the degree. Regardless of the jurisdiction, there is a history associated with the first use of the Super Excellent Master Degree.

The earliest conferrals of this degree can be found in Charleston, South Carolina, and in use by the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite. It was conferred by the Inspector Generals as a side degree and not a formal degree of the Scottish Rite. Later the degree was moved and conferred by the American York Rite of Freemasonry. The degree is not a mandatory degree within the Cryptic Rite. Rather it is a degree which is conferred on occasion and not as a mandatory degree required for advancement within the York Rite.

At the June, 1873 Convention of Royal and Select Masters, held in New York, it was decided the degree would be an honorary degree which could be conferred by a Council if they so desired.

Thus the Super Excellent Master Degree became a part of the Cryptic Rite of Masonry. Because of this degree being held as a part of the Cryptic Degrees, the Scottish Rite gave up their conferral of the degree as a part of their ceremonies. It is now a part of the Cryptic Rite and is conferred on many occasions throughout the world.

It continues to be a beautiful degree which tells a timeless story. If you have never had the opportunity to take the degree, please be sure to attend one of the annual conferrals of the degree here in Kansas. It is conferred every year at the Great Plains Rendezvous where the Grand Councils of Kansas, Wyoming, and Colorado gather to work the degrees of Cryptic Masonry.
