

The Day the War Stopped



The second weekend in June has been a special place for the city of St. Francisville in Louisiana for the last 26 years. This is the date scheduled each year for the Day the War Stopped.

This event is hosted by Feliciana Lodge No, 31 and commemorates the day when the Civil War stopped for 24 hours to honor and bury a brother from New York who had been killed during the battle.

Commander Hart, of the USS Albatross, committed suicide after suffering a fever. His first mate came into town, which they had been shelling for several weeks, and requested a masonic burial for Commander Hart. After some time, the lodge agreed to provide the burial plot and there was an agreement to stop all hostilities for 24 hours.

This event commemorates and recreates the event each year. It is a time for history, food, fellowship, and an appreciation of how mercy and charity is the cornerstone of all masonry.

W. Ron McKenzie Council Receives Charter



During Masonic Week 2024, the W. Ron McKenzie Council, UD received their charter from Great Chief Jim Winzenried during the annual session of the Grand Council of Knight Masons, USA.

Several of their charter and founding members were in attendance to receive the charter. W. Ron McKenzie Council No. 134 is no longer under dispensation from the Grand Council and has provided the necessary documentation and work to have received their Council number. During the session, Cousin Patrick Carr, Past Excellent Chief, received the Order of Knight of Zerubbabel from the Grand Council. This is only the second time this honor has been given out in Kansas. Gary Mason, PEC, received the first last year for his tireless determination and work for his Knight Masons Council.



Competing Early British Grand Lodges

We refer to the UGLE as the mother Grand Lodge because it was the first to be formed. In fact, there were several other competing Grand Lodges operating in England during this same period. Competing Grand Lodges rarely work together, and this was no different between the United Grand Lodge of England and the other Grand Lodges formed and operating during the initial years of the United Grand Lodge of England.

Elias Ashmole is known to be one of the first of the speculative masons entered into a lodge in England. From his own pen we discover he was initiated into a Lodge in Warrenton, Lancashire, England on October 16, 1646, at approximately 4:30 p.m. While Ashmole is referred to as the first English speculative mason, we know this is not accurate. At the Lodge on the day of his initiation he recorded Colonel Henry Mainwaring, Richard Penket Worden, James Collier, Richard Sankey, Henry Littler, John Ellam, Richard Ellam, and Hugh Brewer as being in attendance. That would include seven men who were there to initiate Ashmole in the Lodge, the number needed to make someone an Entered Apprentice Freemason. These men were not stone masons as they held other vocations. So Ashmole was not the first, however he is believed to be the first English speculative mason of which we have proof of his initiation

There were speculative lodges of freemasons operating prior to 1646 in England, however there are little records to prove such an existence. Because of the initiation of Ashmole, we realize there had to be freemasons already in existence in the area.

The Premier Grand Lodge of England was officially formed in 1717 in London, England. It is often regarded as the mother of all Grand Lodges. Four Lodges in London met on June 24, 1717, which was St. John's Day at the Goose and Gridiron tavern and declared themselves to be a Grand Lodge. Subsequently, they elected Anthony Sayer as the first Grand Master. The UGLE is the only recognized Grand Lodge still in existence in England and is the standard for which all regular Grand Lodges are recognized. During this early formation, they made themselves known as the Premier Grand Lodge before changing their name to the United Grand Lodge of England later.

The four lodges associated with forming the Premier Grand Lodge were not the only lodges known to exist at the time. There were some fifty-one Lodges operating in London shortly after that time. These Lodges did not necessarily always come to a situation of peace and brotherly love. Because of this, the concept of the Premier Grand Lodge was brought to light and made into a reality. In 1723, the Premier Grand Lodge sponsored and promoted the creation and printing of The Constitutions of the Freemasons, which is more commonly known as Anderson's Constitutions. This is the rule and guide for freemasons across the globe to use for their own Lodges and Grand Lodges. Compiled and written by the Reverend James Anderson, it serves as a guide for the structure of modern Freemasonry.


Several other competing Grand Lodges were formed in England. These included the Grand Lodge of All England (1725), the Grand Lodge of the Ancients (1753), and the Grand Lodge of England, South of the River Trent (1779). Most of these competing Grand Lodges ceased to exist after a short time, except for the Grand Lodge of the Ancients.

For the most part, there were only two successful Grand Lodges operating within England. These were the Moderns and the Ancients. They both deemed the other to be irregular Grand Lodges. This meant each viewed the other's subordinate Lodges as being illegitimate as well. By 1755, the Ancients had forty Lodges listed on their roll of Lodges. Because of this, the Moderns decided they needed to do something to stem the power which the Ancients had acquired. These two competing Grand Lodges existed separately for 63 years. Neither one ever officially recognized the other during that time.

1818, after four years of discussions between the Moderns and the Ancients, they were able to come to an agreement. On December 27, 1813, the two competing Grand Lodges agreed to set aside their animosity towards each other. They formed the United Grand Lodge of England with the union of their competing Grand Lodges. This merger led to more standardization within the Craft. The ritual and the regalia were standardized under the new Grand Lodge. This led to their core values of brotherly love, relief, and truth. These self-same core values are alive and well today within the Lodges in England under the United Grand Lodge of England.

The York Rite of Freemasonry

The York Rite, or more correctly, the American Rite, is based on the early remnants of Craft Masonry that were practiced in the early 1700's. The formation of the first Grand Lodge of England in 1717 specified that the lodges were to confer only the first three degrees of Craft Masonry.

Three bodies were later formed to work the degrees no longer controlled by the lodges. The Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Council of Royal and Select Masters, and the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar. All three bodies are technically autonomous Masonic entities, only the requirement of membership in the Royal Arch connecting the Cryptic degrees and Chivalric Orders together.

2024 Grand York Rite Sessions Update

Attendees will arrive on Wednesday, May 1, to pick up their registration packets and start the festivities. The Order of Anointed Kings, open to sitting and Past Excellent High Priests, will be held and the Kansas Past Commander's Association, open to sitting and Past Eminent Commanders, will be held later Wednesday afternoon.

The Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Kansas will open their annual session at 8:00 AM on Thursday, May 2, 2024. After lunch, and the close of the session, installation of the new officers will be held. The Kansas College of the York Rite College, and Ashmole Court No. 181, Masonic Order of Athelstan, will have meetings Thursday afternoon after the installation of Chapter officers.
